"I AM" The Door of the Sheep John 10:1-10

<u>v. 1-3</u>

The Sheep

- In Scripture, we as believers are often referred to as sheep.
- Why is this the case?
 - 1) We need protection.
 - 2) We need provision.
 - 3) We tend to wander.
- This comparison is found prevalently in both the Old and New Testament.
- Unbelievers are referred to as goats.

The Shepherd

- The person entrusted with the flock of someone else and sometimes they owned their own sheep.
- Their responsibilities included:
 - 1) Leading them in and out of pasture.
 - 2) To lead them to safe and clean water sources.
 - 3) Protect them from predators and thieves.
- In order to do this their sheep had to be familiar with them.
- They had to have the trust of the sheep in order for them to follow them.
- He enters by the door or gate.
- God is oftentimes compared to a shepherd in both the Old and New Testament.

The Sheepfold

- The sheepfold was a structure that was usually made out of stone in a square, rectangular, or circular shape. A sheep pen.
- It would've been just high enough for the sheep to not be able to see out and predators to not be able to see in.
- It would have one entryway or gate.
- A shepherd would pay to put his sheep into a sheepfold with other flocks while he attended to other business.

The Gatekeeper

- This is someone who would man the gate of the sheepfold.
- He would ward off predators and robbers but only to a certain extent.
- He would be paid to temporarily keep watch over another shepherd's flock.
- Sometimes it was even multiple flocks within the same sheepfold.
- He would only open the door for the shepherd.

The Robber/Thief

- Because there is only one legitimate entryway into the sheepfold, a robber or someone who wanted to do harm, must find another way in.
- His desire and objective was only to kill, steal, and disrupt.
- The door was closed off for him.

<u>v. 3-6</u>

The Relationship Between the Sheep and the Shepherd

- In many sheepfolds there would be multiple flocks at the same time.
- How would a shepherd know who was theirs?

- A shepherd would have such a relationship with his sheep that the sheep would recognize his voice and would come only to him.
- Any other voice they would run away from.
- A shepherd would stand at the gate and call his sheep and they would come.
- Each shepherd had a distinct way of calling his sheep and they were used to that.
- Only his sheep would come out when he called.

Jesus is painting a picture of Him and His sheep and the familiarity that they share with one another.

<u>v. 7-10</u>

I AM the Door of the Sheep

Ego Eimi

- There are two ways to say the phrase "I am" in the Greek language.
- The first is the word *Ego*.
- This is where we get the English word ego which is our personality or personal identity.
- The other way to say I am in Greek is the word *Eimi*.
- To us this seems redundant that Jesus would say "I AM, I AM".
- This is not a translation error or Jesus misspeaking. It is direct and intentional.
- The only other time that this phrasing is seen is in the Greek Septuagint, which is the Greek Old Testament.
- Exodus 3:14
- Jesus is declaring His divinity with this statement.
- Jesus is declaring His Heavenly origin with this statement.
- Jesus is declaring His authority with this statement.

Figure of Speech

- Jesus often taught in parables, allegories, and figures of speech.
- He has explained a scenario in which there's sheep, a sheepfold, a shepherd, a gatekeeper, and thieves.
- They don't quite understand where He is going with them so He gets clear by saying that HE is the door of the sheep.
- He is the door by which the sheep go in and out.
- Everyone else who came before him claiming to be the messiah was a thief and a liar.
- Jesus is the only way to find safety in the sheepfold.
- He is the door to safety, pasture, provision, and eternal life.
- 1) The sheep in the parable are His people that He knows salvifically.
- 2) The sheepfold is safe.
- 3) Jesus calls His people by name. This is for salvation.
 - He calls His people by name and we respond.
 - This is in keeping with God's sovereignty over salvation.
 - When Jesus calls someone to salvation they respond in faith and they desire to be with Him.
- 4) All who enter through the door of Jesus will find eternal life in Him.
